FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR FISHER

John 20:1-10(ESV) ¹Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, “They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.” ³So Peter went out with the other disciple, and they were going toward the tomb. ⁴Both of them were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵And stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen cloths lying there, ⁷and the face cloth, which had been on Jesus’ head, not lying with the linen cloths but folded up in a place by itself. ⁸Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; ⁹for as yet they did not understand the Scripture, that he must rise from the dead. ¹⁰Then the disciples went back to their homes.

Christ is Risen! He has Risen indeed!!
Alleluia!!! I know it’s premature, but I just couldn’t wait. As I write this we are still in

the season of Lent so I will take the time to remind you of our Thursday services 1pm and 7pm as we continue in our Lenten series on the Ten Commandments. I pray that you all will also be able to attend our Holy Week observance which begin on Palm Sunday when we will confirm the catechumens at the 10:30am service and then continue with Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services being at 1pm and 7pm, the Easter Vigil at 6:30pm on April 15th, and our Easter services with 6am, 8am, and 10:30am with a breakfast being served at 7am. Don’t forget the Easter egg hunt on Saturday the 15th 10am



During the final week of the Lenten season, the Holy Church remembers the events surrounding the Passion of Our Lord Jesus. So, I would like to give you a overview of Holy week to assist you in your own meditation on our Lord’s Passion and Resurrection.

The Holy week begins with the Lord’s triumphant and joyful entry to Jerusalem. In many congregations, palms are distributed and the people process into the Divine Service, singing, “All glory, laud and honor to You Redeemer King!” Then crosses and statues may be veiled, as the service moves in a somber direction. Matthew’s account of the Passion is often read

and the Divine Service celebrated. Holy Monday traditionally features reading from John 12 (“the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified”). Holy Tuesday, provides opportunity to hear the account of the Passion from Mark (Mark 14:1-15:47), and Holy Wednesday would include the reading of the Lord’s Passion from Luke’s Gospel (Luke 22:1-23:56). Since these Holy Days are not part of our celebration of Holy Week the assigned Gospel readings are included for your personal use.

Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday), Good Friday, and Holy Saturday from a unit called Triduum (Latin for “three days”). Triduum is a single service that continues (with interruption) from Thursday to Saturday evening. In the evening of Holy Thursday, we especially remember the institution of the Lord’s Supper and the “new command” Jesus gave regarding His love. The altar is stripped as the congregation prays Psalm 22, then leaves in silence. The congregation gathers again on Good Friday for the chief service. The liturgy this day is severely simple, featuring St. John’s Passion account, the ancient Bidding Prayer, and the adoration of the crucified. Many churches also observe Tenebrae, a service where psalms are prayed during growing darkness, symbolizing the extinguishing of our Lord’s breath upon the cross. The conclusion of the three-day service, the observance of the great vigil of Easter, constitutes the longest piece of the three-day service. It begins in the darkness where Tenebrae left us and then brings us to the shining light that broke forth in resurrection, celebrating our Pass-over with Christ

Jesus from death to life in Holy Baptism and the Eucharist (Lord’s Supper).



I pray this helps you with your Easter preparation and celebration. God Bless and have a very Blessed Easter and don’t ever forget, Christ is Risen! He has Risen indeed!! Alleluia!!!

Board of Elders Meeting Minutes, Pilgrim

The meeting began with prayer by Pr. Fisher at 6:34. Present at the meeting were Pr. Fisher, Dave, Brian, Tanner, Ron, Dennis, Gary, and John. Absent were Pr. Raffa and Howie.

The elders will be funding their Lenten meal on the 23rd via a Thrivent gift card. They will serve burgers and brats.

Schedules were made through 4/16.

Research was delivered regarding the sanctuary light (i.e., the eternal flame). A question had arisen as to whether it would be appropriate to our confession to maintain it in light of its questionable use in Catholic churches. In short, the matter is not a concern. The elders will investigate wall-mounted alternatives to suggest to the congregation.

The elders are checking to see what the cost would be to acquire an LCMS flag in the event of our Christian flag wearing out somehow. The elders tentatively wish to eventually trade out the flags, but more research and discussion among the congregation is needed.

Dennis has been working at reestablishing contact with several lapsed members.

The pastors and elders are continuing to study the question as to whether fund raising in the church is being done in keeping with our faith. Pr. Fisher will deliver his findings for our consideration when next we meet.

In light of the above, the elders are considering the possibility of holding a brat fry across the street at some point.

The elders hope to have pictures of us labeled with our family groups on the bulletin board.

We will soon be celebrating the 10th anniversary of Pr. Raffa's ordination here at Pilgrim.

A question was raised as to whether prospective communicant visitors can be better ministered to in light of and in keeping with the doctrine of closed communion.

We discussed some usher procedures.

We finalized plans for the elders' Lenten meal.

We discussed pictures and buying deadlines.

We discussed selling pizza cards at the Luther movie.

Pr. Fisher shared a letter asking for financial assistance. Pr. Fisher is willing to offer help of his own resources and asks that it may be done in the Church's name. We will bring this to the council when next they meet.

The meeting concluded with prayer by Pastor Fisher at 8:27.

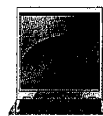

On November 1, 1961, the LLL purchased the property that is now Camp LuWiSoMo from George Peacock. On July 22, 1962, 1,000 people gathered on the newly purchased property for the dedication of Camp LuWiSoMo. This continued on 1963, and in 1964 they decided to serve a chicken barbecue, which was provided by the Brakebush Brothers. This evolved into what is now known as Family Weekend, an annual event to celebrate camp and what God is doing and has done here. To this day we still celebrate with Brakebush chicken BBQ!

This year we will be celebrating again, but things will look a little different.

We are excited for the new changes to our Family Weekend schedule. We will be kicking off the weekend with a Fish Fry by Your Friends from Reedsburg, the original fish frying group, a welcome gathering and celebration in the Chapel, and a campfire and sing-a-long.

Saturday will kick off with Family Growth time, the Pastor Bill Walk for LuWiSoMo, and the Silent Auction. The rest of the morning will feature activity sessions taught by our summer staff and alumni. What Else is Going On?

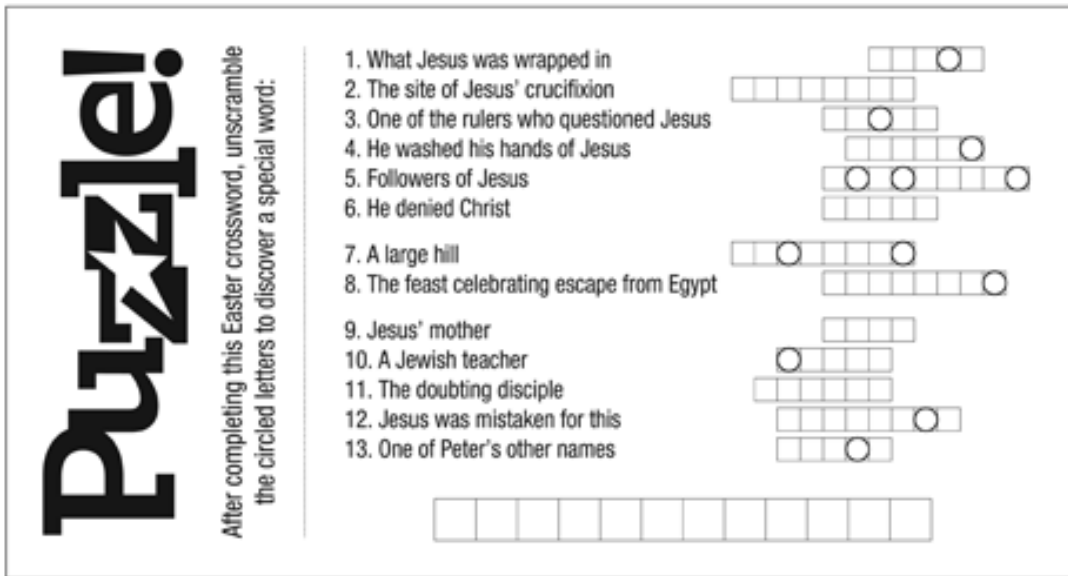

Expanding our view of service

We often think of serving in terms of Matthew 25: supplying food and clothing; caring for the sick, incarcerated and other “least of these” members of society — serving Jesus in the process. But we also can serve him with our unique talents and by doing things we love.

For example, Ged King, a barber in England, devotes some of his time off to giving homeless people free haircuts. Imagine Jesus saying, “For my hair was long and scraggly, and you cut it” — or “My heart was lonely, and you played music to lift my spirits. I could no longer read small print, and you read to me. I have to work two jobs, and you invited my child to spend afternoons crafting with you. My car broke down, and you repaired it.” Then the King will say, “Come, you who are blessed by my Father ... whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me” (Matthew 25:34, 40, NIV; emphasis added).

JESUS IS RISEN!

When Jesus' disciples saw that the stone was rolled away from his tomb, they knew he had risen. Make a moveable tomb to celebrate Easter.

What you need:

- 4 pieces of paper (brown, blue, black, yellow)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Brad fastener
- Marker



What you do:

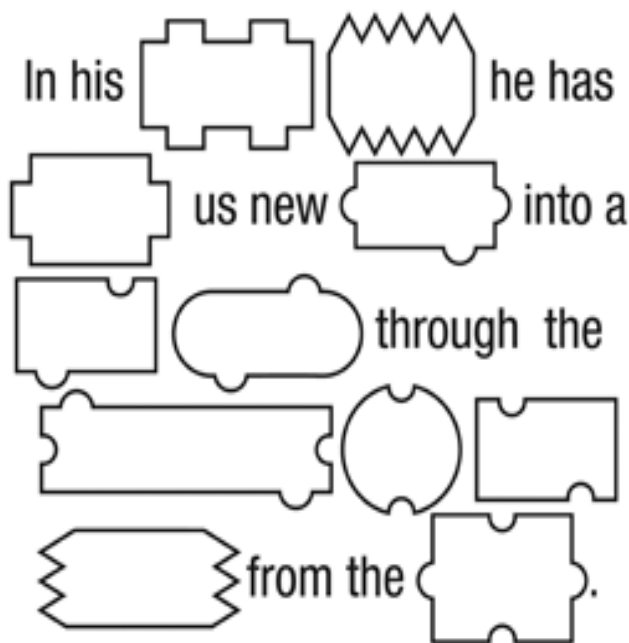
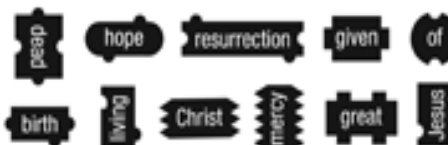
1. Fold the brown paper in half, short side to short side. Cut along the fold. On one half, draw and cut out a large half-circle (the tomb). On the other, draw and cut out a palm-sized circle (the stone).
2. Glue the brown tomb onto the blue paper.
3. Cut a black circle (the inside of the tomb) the same size as the brown stone and glue it onto the brown tomb.
4. Place the brown stone over the black half-circle; this is the entrance. Push the brad through one edge so the stone can move from side to side.
5. Cut out a cross from the yellow paper and glue it by the tomb.
6. Write "Jesus is risen!" atop the blue paper.
