# JULY: GOD LOVES THE CHEERFUL GIVER

"The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully.

Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" [2nd Cor. 9:6-7]

This past Sunday we had our June voter's meeting. It was a relatively short meeting. However, we spent a majority of the time discussing the finances of our church and it was apparent that while we are doing ok, we are in need of a more fruitful donation. I must admit the meeting left me anxious even as I know that the Lord will provide for all our needs, both of body and soul.

I wondered, as I walked back to the parsonage, what is it about money? What is that little switch that is tripped deep within our being, right between the compassion and responsibility buttons, when money is involved. Money is a funny thing. It makes us crazy. Why does money so often render us only cheap and joyless, often under a masquerade of responsibility. In his book, *The Spirituality of Fund Raising*, Henry Noumen makes this insightful observation:

"Where is your security base? Is it in God or is it in money? It is very interesting and it's very important to realize that money is one of the greatest taboos around. Greater than sex, greater than religion. A lot of people say, 'Don't talk about religion, that's my private business. Don't talk about sex.' But talking about money is even harder. Money is one of the greatest taboos... And the reason for the taboo is that money obviously has something to do with that intimate little place in your heart where you need security, and you don't want to give that away."

The heart is the place that we reserve for the building and polishing of our idols, of our false gods. You know the text well, "No one can serve two masters for either he will hate the one and love the other...You cannot serve God and money" (Mat 6:24). Every one of our hearts is tainted and condemned by Jesus' words here. Bear in mind, greed is not merely the idol of the rich, it is just as easily the idol of the poor as well. We beg of the Lord before we die, "Remove far from me falsehood and lying; give me neither poverty nor riches; feed me with the food that is needful for me, lest I be full and deny you and say, "Who is the Lord?" or lest I be poor and steal and profane the name of my God" (Prov 30:8-9). Whether in abundance or in famine we must realize that the problem is not money; the problem is our heart. Greed lives in the heart, not the wallet. So, greed is often one of those obvious sins, but it masquerades so devilishly, so sanctimoniously that we often fail to see it. We often fail to see that quickly and without warning our trust, security, and hope is toward this thing called money, toward these things we call, stuff.

Now the knee-jerk reaction to a lack of donations, to a lack of anything, whether it be in the church or in the world, is to resort to the Law. It is to attempt to forcibly confiscate what we need. When we think the Gospel has failed in its apparent lack of results, in not fulfilling our desires, we will often turn to the Law, or even seductively try and put teeth in the Gospel, which is no Gospel at all. Granted, we must make the need aware to all, so they have an opportunity to give, but we cannot force a person to be a cheerful giver, that comes only by way of the Gospel.

So the solution to our problem, to our dwindling donations, is never the Law. It's never to shame people as to the size of their gift. It's never to demand with the ultimatum that people give the church their pensions, life-savings, or bank account numbers, or it will have to close up shop. This only leads to stubbornness on the part of the giver. Ever try and force a teenager, a spouse, a friend, to do something they don't want to do? How'd that work out for you? Not well. Rather, the better way, the only way, is the Gospel, is to teach about Jesus, to give Jesus. For the ethical behavior and life of good works in the Christian flows precisely from the pulpit and the altar of God, from the body and blood of Christ, the gift of the forgiveness of sins. Whereas the Law, the iron rod, begets sin. The Gospel, the gift, begets gift.

St. Paul teaches us, "God loves a cheerful giver." He instructs the church at Corinth to be generous to the saints suffering poverty and famine in Jerusalem. There is a profound joy in giving, for one is not merely giving to a poor and needy neighbor, an empty common chest of the church, one is giving unto Christ who lives in the poor and needy, who is the body of the church. But we wonder, "How shall I find such joy in giving? I've got this little heart and a wee little Pharisee is pumping idolatrous blood into it?" Enter the narrative of Zacchaeus.

Zacchaeus was a rich man, a chief tax-collector. He sought a glimpse of Jesus. But he was too small to see over the large crowds that followed Jesus. So he climbed up a sycamore tree. Immediately, Jesus saw him up in the tree and requested that he get down for he wanted to dine with him in his house that day. Zacchaeus was giddy and overjoyed by the presence of Jesus in his house. The Pharisees not so much. They grumbled and groused with one another. Zacchaeus, being miserly most of his life, was

changed man after Jesus entered his house, forgiving him his sin. From that absolution came generosity, came a repentant heart that flowed with joy at not only giving back what he had taken, but giving fourfold what he had defrauded his fellow neighbor out of. "Jesus is the greatest joy the human heart can experience," quipped Luther. The joy over Jesus is the "real motive of ethical behavior" of giving alms.

Good cheer and generosity are the products of a heart set free from its gods. In all things, in all times of this temporal life, in every chance we have, every person we meet, every gift we give, we do so with a cheerful heart, with a heart forgiven and set free to give. And it's not the size of the gift that matters, but the gift given from a heart set free. "Truly, truly I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the offering box. For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on" (Mark 12:43-44). "Once when Luther was traveling to Jessen (a little town on the Black Elster River) to recuperate, along with Dr. Jonas, Veit Dietrich, and other table companions, though he himself did not have all that much, he gave alms to the poor there. Dr. Jonas followed his example, with the explanation: Who knows where God will provide the same for me another time! To which Luther replied with a laugh: As if your God has not provided it for you already."

I leave you with these Gospel thoughts, and the prayer that I closed with at the voter's meeting. "O Lord Jesus Christ, who didst once sit over against the treasury to observe how Thy people gave, and hast caused Thy presence there in the Temple to be recorded that we may know that Thou art sill concerned, grant Thy people the willingness and love which the Poor Widow did manifest, who gave all that she had; and grant

unto us, to whom the care of Thy treasury is given, a seemly concern like unto Thine own, that Thy children give as Thou has prospered them, and that Thy coffers may be filled with the means to spread the Gospel in the world and maintain the ordinances of Thy house among us, and to provide the means whereby the suffering of the sick, the poor, and the aged may be alleviated; who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end." Amen.

Board of Elders Meeting Minutes, Pilgrim Ev. Lutheran Church 6/6/2016

The meeting began with prayer by Pr. Fisher at 6:45. Present at the meeting were Gary, Howard, Ken, Tanner, Brian, and Allen. Absent were Dave and Ron.

Schedules were made through Thurs, Sept. 8.

Pastor Fisher will be unavailable June 18-19th due to helping St. John's Mayville. He will be unavailable from June 20-27 due to vacation. Pastor Raffa will be unavailable on June 8, 11, and 12 due to helping St. John's Mayville.

The next meeting will be on Sept 6, since the 5th is labor day.

Pr. Fisher noted that a new member, having experience with working with handicapped persons, would be interested in a one day VBS for the same. The elders consented with no opposition.

Pr. Fisher notes that the synodical convention is drawing near (July 9-14).

The elders note joy for the support in the debt reduction effort, though we hope to see the effort carry through to completion.

The possibility of acquiring a processional cross for use in Feastday and High Holy day services was considered. The pastors and elders are in favor of the idea. Pr. Raffa noted that it is necessary to educate the congregation of the historic use of such in the Church catholic before introducing anything new. Pr. Raffa also notes that a crucifer will be needed for services in which it is to be used. At present, the cost of such remains the primary obstacle, though perhaps cheep and appropriately crafted options are available. This matter will be brought to the Church Council for further discussion.

The elders note that the website remains in need of work.

Allen will be moving to CA in early August. Pr. plans to have a farewell and Godspeed rubric on the July 31 services. Hopefully his replacement frequents the 10:30 service!

The elders note infrequent lapses among the ushers, a matter to be brought to the head usher.

Pr. Fisher notes that there is no synod-wide standard for the age at which a youth receives the Sacrament. This issue leads to some confusion. This is, however, the reason that a few select children receive the Supper despite being abnormally young.

We opted to postpone our study given lateness. We will resume in study with the video for Ch. 3, proceeding to the text for Ch. 4 when next we meet.

The meeting concluded with prayer by Pastor Raffa at 7:54.

for Allen and Margie Latall will be held on Sunday, July 31st at the 10:30 am. service. Allen and Margie will be truly missed by all of us when they move to California.





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
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Pilgrim Ev. Lutheran Church, Council Meeting Minutes, June 13, 2016

Meeting was called to order by President Jerry Sommer at 7:00 pm.

Pastor Fisher opened with prayer.

President Jerry Sommer asked for any corrections to the last minutes of May 9, 2016.


Celebrate summer with this tasty dessert pizza, using your favorite summer fruits as the toppings. A

# What you need:

- 1 tube slice-and-bake sugar cookie dough
- Knife
- Round pizza pan
- · 8 ounces cream cheese
- ½ cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups sliced fruit
- Aduİt help

# What you do:

- Cut the dough into slices ¹/s-inch thick. Place slices on the pan, overlapping them slightly.
