# JULY: RELIGIOUS FREEDOM—THE FIRST FREEDOM

The ingenious design of American governance is its pledge to protect the liberty of all its citizens while respecting their equality before the law. The government protects a citizen's freedom to seek the truth about God, to worship according to their conscience, to live out their faith in the public square. So also, citizens are free to enter into contracts and to form associations according to their own values.

While the government must treat everyone equally, people in the private sector are free to make responsible distinctions—including ones based on good-faith moral convictions—in their economic endeavors. Government should not impose burdens on sincere religious beliefs unless it can prove that it must—or, as the law puts it, that the burden imposed on those beliefs is the least restrictive means of advancing a compelling government interest.

Granted, those who make decisions based on moral and religious views may well pay a price in the market, perhaps losing customers and qualified employees, yet such choices should remain lawful. They entail the freedom to choose whom to associate with, when, and on what terms, as well as the freedom to choose whom to do business with and for what good and services. Governmental mandates that impinge on these freedoms should be imposed only for compelling reasons.

The faith-guided owners of the family business see their professional work as an extension of that very faith. Thus, a wedding photographer, for example, doesn't just provide a business service but uses her God given talents to tell the story of a particular couple and their relationships. Helping to celebrate a same-sex relation-

ship as a marriage affirms that relationship, and it's unreasonable to coerce religious believers to do that.

The government should not be determining who is right or wrong about baking cakes or taking photographs for same-sex weddings. You don't have to share the beliefs of the owners of a particular bakery, flower shop, or farmer's stand, to recognize that they ought to be free to run their business in accordance with their values—without fear of reprisal from the government. And the first reason why is this. Religious freedom is the first freedom of citizens.

The Founding Father of the United States established a political society unlike any other in all of human history. Here we would not merely "tolerate" the religious practice of minorities but would protect the right of all people to liberty of conscience and the free exercise of religion. The Founders recognizes that religious liberty is God-given *natural* right, not the creation of government. States must respect and protect this right, never undermine or attack it. George Washington, in a letter dated August 21, 1970, to the Hebrew congregation of Newport, Rhode Island, perhaps said it best:

"The citizens of the United States of America have a right to applaud themselves for having given to mankind examples of an enlarged liberal policy—a policy worthy of imitation. All possess alike liberty of conscience and immunities of citizenship. It is now no more that toleration is spoken of as if it were the indulgence of the one class of people that another enjoyed the exercise of their inherent natural rights, for, happily, the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only

that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens in giving it on all occasions their effectual support."

In America, religious liberty is not the result of mere "toleration" but an inherent natural right. A hallmark of true religious liberty is that it is extended to persons of all faiths, even if their beliefs seem unfounded, flawed, implausible, or downright silly. The foundation of religious freedom, however, is not skepticism, relativism, or indifferentism about theological questions. It is the objective value of the religious quest—seeking to understand the truth about ultimate questions and conforming one's life to that truth with integrity.

It is a fulfillment of human nature to think about the existence of God and what He might demand of us and to aspire to live in accordance with our conclusions. Throughout human history people have sought the truth about ultimate—and divine—reality and have shaped their lives accordingly. Religious freedom respects the right of all persons to pursue these ends. It is not a concession of the government to is subjects but a natural right that the government recognizes, protects, and is limited by. We are to render to Caesar what is Caesar, but to God what is God's, because Caesar is not God. Religion is outside of the jurisdiction of Caesar, who must acknowledge that men's consciences are bound by a higher law.

This view of religious liberty has found its place in our civil law. As James Madison, wrote in his *Memorial and Remonstrance*, "The Religion then of very man must be left to the conviction and conscience of every man." It is an "arrogant pretention" to believe that "the Civil Magistrate is a competent Judge of Religious Truth." The First Amendment to the Constitution has been understood to embody this vision of religious liberty

for much of our history.

The right to religious liberty is the result of a prior *duty* to seek out the truth about God and the cosmos. In that same address, *Memorial and Remonstrance*, Madison explains:

"What is here a right towards men, is a duty towards the Creator. It is the duty of every man to render to the Creator such homage and such only as he believes to be acceptable to him. This duty is precedent, both in order of time and in degree of obligation, to the claims of Civil Society."

At the time of its founding, the government of the United States was virtually unique in protecting the space for its citizens to fulfill this duty according to their own best judgement. As Professor Michael McConnell of Stanford Law School explains,

"In the liberal tradition, the government's role is not to make theological judgements but to protect the right of the people to pursue their own understandings of the truth, within the limits of the common good. That is the difference between "the full and free exercise of religion" (Madison's formulation) and mere "toleration." Toleration presuppose a "dominate group" within a particular opinion about religious (that it is "false," or as at least unwarranted"), who decide not to "eradicate" beliefs they regard as "wrong, mistaken, or undesirable."

I know you're thinking it. I am too. So, before you and I draw various conclusions from this, we must note that *religious liberty is not unlimited*. The State can rightly limit it when justice and the

common good so require. In such cases, the limitation of religious liberty is an incidental but unavoidable (and thus justified) effect of the government's action to secure justice. This principle is the basis of the federal Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) and the various state versions of the same statute. These laws require that regulations which curb religious expression serve a compelling government interest and do so by the least restrictive means possible.

As a matter of natural law, the right to religious liberty is based on the moral truth that sincere religious activity, freely undertaken, is valuable in itself—it is a basic component of human well-being—and should be allowed to flourish. In other words, people realize the good of religion even if they make mistake about religious truth. Assuming that one's religious act is sincere (and not, say, merely an attempt to satisfy social expectations), even imperfect expressions of religion are valuable.

Religious liberty is important because the search for truth about ultimate things and the effort to live according to that truth are valuable *only* if they are *freely undertaken*. The state, therefore, should protect religious freedom. The quest for religious truth, adherence to religious faith and morals, and the pursuit of a relationship with the divine must be free from coercion.

Board of Elders Meeting Minutes, Pilgrim Ev. Lutheran Church 6/5/2017

The meeting began with prayer by Pr. Raffa at 6:36. Present at the meeting were Pr. Raffa, Brian, Tanner, Dennis, Gary, and John. Absent were Pr. Fisher, Howie, and Ron.

Schedules were made through September 10th. The next meeting will be on September 5th, being the day after Labor Day.

The eternal flame was briefly discussed. The elders are still pondering what (if anything) to do about the light, as batteries are somewhat expensive.

Progress is being made on the website. Progress is also being made on the directory. Pr. Fisher and Jim Behrens will be departing on June 29th for Strasbourg. They will return on July 18th.

Pr. Fisher will be having his knee replaced late August and will thus be out of commission while he recovers.

Regarding communion and Matins: Pr. Raffa's research has found that there is no historic precedence for the service of the Sacrament being combined with a minor office, for the minor offices were intended precisely for the divine service. We are still waiting on information from Pr. Fisher's sources before anything can be definitively decided. We will note, however, that as excellent as Matins is, it is categorically less precious to Christian life than the Lord's Supper. Therefore, either the two can be combined or Matins will not occur within normal Sunday services; the Eucharist will not be withheld. Rooted in Christ has begun and is going well so far. Notably, this takes place at 12:30 on Sunday,

though in Pr. Fisher's assorted absences this summer it will fill the bible study slot at 9:15. The pastors and elders continue to comb through some inactive members (absent for upwards of 3 years or so) to reestablish contact with them. If we fail to find any trace, the names will be duly submitted to the voters' meetings in the future. There is no great urgency, however. This process naturally must after all be evangelical in nature.

Our book study was postponed owing to the time.

The meeting concluded with prayer by Pastor Raffa at 8:02.



# A pilgrim's progress

In A Million Steps, Kurt Koontz describes his month-long pilgrimage along the Camino de Santiago ("Way of St. James"), a 490-mile route from southern France through northern Spain. Since the ninth century, millions have undertaken this challenging trek.

As Koontz hiked downhill one morning, he was awed by a gorgeous sunrise. "The path was so steep," he writes, "that I could descend a bit and relive the sunrise over and over. I took a gazillion photos and must have looked back at least 40 times." Yet the experience made Koontz realize that "going forward is difficult when you are always looking backward." We can't dwell on the past so completely that our progress and growth are impeded.

Jesus says, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62, NRSV). As we walk the path of faith, may we give thanks for God's past gifts while focusing on Jesus, who leads us ever forward.


