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NOVEMBER: THE LANGUAGE OF PRAISE

"My soul makes its boast in the Lord; let the humble hear and be glad. Oh, magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together!" [Psalm 34:2-3]

As the leaves change color and the temperatures drop, as the grocery store shelves swell with the jellied cranberry sauce, the 10lb bags of potatoes, the plump turkeys, and the pumpkin and pecan pies, as November bleeds into December, we often turn to a more reflective mood. We hold closer the precious gifts that have abundantly fallen from our Father's hand, and we grieve greater all that has been taken away, all that is broken, and all that is lost. It's a good time. It's a hard time. Yet it remains always a time of thanksgiving, a life and language of praise.

In the recent past, I finished a book entitled, "Bright Valley of Love" by Edna Hong. Its pages narrate a true story of a young boy by the name of Gunther. He was born in Germany in 1914. His father was off fighting in World War I. His mother had deserted him. His grandmother ended up looking after him. Her lack of attention and abuse of Gunther led to the debilitating disease of rickets, a bone disease in children that causes weak bones, bowed legs, and many other bone malformities. These first pages are very dark and painful to read. Hope begins grow in 1921 when his father and grandmother give him up to a Christian colony near Bielefeld, Germany. Its name is Bethel ("house of God,") and Gunther stays in a house called Patmos. It's named after the Greek island where St. John received a vision from the Lord of the promised new heavens and new earth. This safe-haven for the world's unwanted is led by Rev. Fritz Von Bodelschwingh. As the pages are turned, one learns about Gunther's experiences and education, and his relationships with other children; the emotional strains of entering adulthood; and

the unique personalities of the pastors, including one bearded pastor who constantly plays hymn tunes on his brass trumpet. The book begins in a valley of shadowy dereliction and abandonment, only to end in a valley of Christ's love, poured out for all.

All of life is an act of worship, of prayer and praise, of thanksgiving. One chapter in this bright valley of love enlightens us to this truth. It was a Sunday in August of 1921 that for Gunther eternity entered into time. He is seven years old. His mind and spirit had yet to experience the world in all its uniqueness and giftedness. What are these things: wind, stars, sand, mud, pebbles, angleworms, butterflies-Gunther had no idea. He knew not the nature of love, how it felt, how to express it. "I love you" was a foreign phrase to him. His ears had never heard its tender sound. But Gunther would discover that day, that His Father and Creator, intended him to be, meant for him to live, to be loved, and to love. Enlivened by his Father's gift of life, Gunther wanted to live, he wanted to know who his heavenly Father was. A fellow friend, known as "blind Willi" had begun to tutor Gunther in the language of praise. That Sunday morning when "Sister Mathilde" went to get Gunther dressed, she was met by an ecstatic Willie, who exclaimed that he had taught Gunther how to pray. This exchange, like many others in the book, brings joyful tears to one's eyes:

"Gunther pray for Tante Mathilde." "Or-r-r Fah-h-er hoo-oo is-s-s..." Gunther looked questioningly at his teacher. "Our Father, who is in heaven. In *heaven*, Gunther."

"Or-r-r Fah-h-er hoo-oo is-s-s in heff--en "Good Gunther! Wonderful!" cried Sister Mathilde (42).

From this point on Gunther's body, mind, and spirit continued to develop. Eager to make up for lost time, Gunther asked tons of questions and was like a sponge when it came to his heavenly Father's world. In a one-room school house, with ten children, Gunther learned about numbers and colors, words, and much more. Hong writes, "Here in this little schoolroom Gunther began learning the language which is very special to the Valley of Bethel. True, it is an international language and not just Bethel's alone. Every nation has some persons who know the language. It is a super-national language and has nothing at all to do with nations. It has to do with grateful hearts. Since Bethel was a valley full of grateful hearts, it spoke this language fluently. That is, the language of praise" (46).

That Sunday in August of 1921 Gunther didn't understand the wrong that had happened to him, or much more, why it had to happen. He knew that something was not right, not only with his body, but of all those who lived in the House of Patoms. He saw it with his own eyes. Friends who were suffering in life to pre-birth, in-birth, or after-birth maddening and mysterious suffering. There was Henrik, who couldn't control his muscle movements. To feed him was a herculean task. He would spasm so often that is was near impossible to get him to swallow the food as his teeth clenched and the food dribbled to the floor. There was Leni and Manfred, who could walk and talk and feed themselves, but something was wrong in their brains. "Fit's" they would call them. Later, they would be known as epileptic attacks that come upon a person suddenly and unexpectedly, as perhaps a sneeze or a spell of hiccups. Others had little moments of pure confusion, brownouts in the mind, dizziness, sagging head, small jerkings and twitchings of the body. Other epileptics seizures that Gunther saw were quite violent, like a sudden shriek, or a raucous cry of a bird.

Despite all this sadness, brokenness, while the world has always pushed them out of sight and mind, those living in the House of Bethel, this House of God, knew that from strongest of them to the weakest of them, all of them knew and understood the language of praise. Dora, one of Gunther's closest friends, who was greatly stricken with being deaf and unable to speak clearly and could only shout uncontrollably, one only had to look into her eyes to know that those sounds spelled sheer delight and a life of praise. Her eyes said, "I love you."

A life of praise, a language of praise, never looks like we think it should. That Sunday in August of 1921, the eternity and love of God poured out in strange way, in the midst of suffering, in the midst of the great "why's" of life, in the midst of a child struggling and joyously learning the simple yet eternal language of his Heavenly Father. The children of God never look the way you think. The children of God never praise their Father in words of their own, but in the words that have been given them to speak, to praise their most gracious God, for the greatest gift: His Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. It's not flashy. It's not relevant. It's not smart. Rather, it's simple. It's outdated by the world's standards. It's foolishness. It's a crucified God yet risen from the dead.

In the small little schoolroom, Gunther learned what God is to him: Father. And this Father has many sons because His one and only begotten Son carried out His Father's will that He rescue everyone. And so you, along with Gunther are sons of the Father, and the Father has sent the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying, "Or-rr Fah-h-er hoo-oo is-s-s in heff—en." Thanksgiving is not absent in the midst of human suffering, even in the mysterious "thorn in the flesh." Rather, we vow that having manifold proof that God loves us in His Son, no matter who we are and what crosses befall us, that what our Father has said has come to pass for our forgiveness and eternal life. Because of this great gift, our life will be a perpetual song of praise in the courts of all the redeemed. Reflect on this, this thanksgiving season. Reflect that it's not just a season, it is a way of life here below, and the way of eternity in the courts of heaven forever.


October is Pastor Appreciation Month

Brothers and sisters in Christ:

Pastors are an essential part of what church is about. Each of us knows how precious a faithful pastor is not only to the congregation but to each of us as members of a parish. My pastors; Rev. Joseph Fisher and Rev. Chris Raffa, are great blessings to my wife, Lynn, myself, and my mother who is in a nursing home in West Bend. Part of my appreciation is to mention them here as I give thanks for their faithfulness and pastoral care of the Bride of Christ, the church.

Most don't see all that a pastor does in a normal week. Being a pastor involves more than forty hours a week. Each week there is a new sermon to write, perhaps more than one if there is a funeral that week. There are preparations for various meetings and as well as Bible Classes to teach. There are visitations with the sick and shut-in. There may well be counseling sessions with individuals and couples. There are home visits to make. President Harrison has been talking about the necessity of pastors doing that more. There are circuit meetings and district pastors' conferences to attend from time to time.

Most don't realize how comprehensive the office of being a pastor is. The list of pastoral responsibilities to God and His people are inexhaustive. We expect our pastor to always have a smile on his face, regardless of how difficult the day has been. We expect him to always have time for us when we call or stop by, regardless of what else has been on his agenda that day. There are things that our pastors do which we will never see. Their witness, the way in which they honor the office they hold, their compassion and dedication are to be commended.



Pastors also have families; children and a wife, parents, brothers and sisters. As demanding as is the pastoral office, the pastor's family is more important. Does your pastor take the time to care for his family, time to spend with his wife and children?

The emotional, psychological, and spiritual stressors in a pastors' life can be exhausting. I have walked with more than a couple pastors and their families as they have journeyed down that dark valley of exhaustion and depression. It is not a fun place to be. There are organizations that help at times like that: DOXOLOGY. Shepherd's Canyon. Grace Place. We have provided scholarships to pastors and their families to take advantage of what those helping organizations

offer.

That said, ordinarily the best place for pastoral care is the local parish. Rev. David Muensch, pastoral care advisor for Concordia Health Plans, describes what that might look like when he writes in a recent article:

It has been suggested that Pastoral ministry involves activity in at least 13 different "task clusters" (i.e. Administration, Care-giving, Rituals and Sacraments, Management, Communication, Preaching, Public Worship, etc.) which require 64 personal competencies. Now, you and I know that Pastors are human,

and no one is "excellent" in every one of these specific competencies, but the importance of the work means that your Pastor(s) are making efforts in each of them. Many of these efforts happen in quiet, confidential, and private ways. It could not be otherwise. As a result, there is much which is accomplished in Pastoral ministry of which you are unaware until/unless it intersects with you and your family, and it can be difficult for him to know of the support and affirmation of the people he's called to serve. Please consider regularly providing support and affirmation for your pastor(s), and especially in October-Pastor Appreciation Month.

Here are some ideas to get you started in your planning:

- Pray for your pastor
- Authorize the formation of a special committee to "care for pastor"
- Express appreciation, written and spoken
- Respect his time, and encourage him to get appropriate rest and renewal
- Live in peace
- Discover and encourage him in his personal interests

- Support a strategy for professional connec tions, including outside of ministry
- Encourage him to plan significant and meaningful time with his loved ones
- Lovingly insist he take vacation, and provide resources for his duties to be covered in his absence
- If he's married, learn from his wife of the special/unique challenges confronting her, and be sensitive to expectations inappropriately placed upon her.

This outline is a devotional reading plan that covers the entire Sacred Scriptures each year. The selections are based on ancient models and are generally in harmony with the liturgical church year. The average reading is three chapters daily. The lectionary is in accordance with Martin Luther's suggestions: "But let the entire Psalter, divided in parts, remain in use and the entire Scriptures, divided in lections, let this be preserved in the ears of the church". Also: "after that another book should be selected, and so on, until the entire Bible has been read through, and where one does not understand it, pass that by and glorify God."

What a pleasant surprise this morning to come to the school and find that all the families are dressed and ready for family photos! Back in August, not everyone had arrived for the opening service and first day of classes. Now in our fourth week of studies, everyone has settled into their homes and have begun to celebrate our common faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. At the center of the campus (and campus life) is the symbol of our faith, the cross. The mark of the Alpha and Omega is a common symbol used by the CLET as well as the national Lutheran church in Togo. We gathered here today for this photo.

The students represent 6 different church bodies (6 countries: Guinea, C6te d'Ivoire, Togo, Republic of the Congo, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Burundi) of which 6 students are returning for their final year and 14 students are beginning their three years of study. Among the families, 11 wives are here and attend the Ladies' School 3 times a week. As you can also see, there are plenty of children as well! Pray for their transition, health and well-being, for their assimilation into the community, and most of all, their continued growth in the Christian faith. Thank you, my fellow redeemed, for the support and prayers you have given to the proclamation of the Gospel through this theological institution and these future pastors and families.

Always Thankful

Martin Rinkart, a German Lutheran minister, wrote the hymn "Now Thank We All Our God" in 1636. At the time the Thirty Years' War was ravaging central Europe, claiming millions of lives. Rinkart served as pastor in Eilenburg, a walled town that became a crowded refuge for starving fugitives. Although Rinkart was struggling to provide for his own family, he opened his own home to people in need.

After the plague entered Eilenburg, Rinkart conducted up to 50 funerals a day—including services for his wife and the only two other pastors in town. Amid the despair, he wrote many hymns, including "Now Thank We All Our God." Originally intended as a table prayer, it's now sung at Thanksgiving to remember God's "countless gifts of love" - even during hardships.

From harm to good

Squanto, the Native American who helped the Pilgrims, had a background remarkably similar to that of Joseph in Genesis.

Years before the Pilgrims arrived in America, English traders kidnapped Squanto and other Native Americans and sold them as slaves in Spain. Incredibly, Squanto was bought by monks, who set him free and taught him about Jesus. Later Squanto sailed to England, hoping for passage to America. But he had to wait years, so he worked as a stable hand and learned English. Finally able to travel home, he was devastated to find his tribe wiped out by smallpox.

A couple of years later, the Pilgrims came ashore, tired, sick and having lost many shipmates on the way. Implausibly, they met an English speaking Native American, who shared his friendship and knowledge. Like Joseph going from his homeland to Egypt and from slave to expert leader, Squanto experienced God's leading—even when the path was littered with misfortune.

Using Squanto, God saved a whole community. What some intended for harm, God turned to good (see Genesis 50:20).

Be here and everywhere adored.


Thy children bless and grant that we
