SEPTEMBER: PASTORAL CATECHE-SIS OF THE YOUNG

Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep."

[John 21:17]

"These are the ones who will take our place someday" the old pastor said to the young pastor, as he looked out among his congregation, among those little lambs standing before the altar of God to confess the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic faith. The change of calendar, the sands that fall through the hourglass, all improvement and all deterioration will in large part be shaped by the youth of our day. Now if the youth were of some kind of silly putty that that could be easily molded into a God-fearing, respectable, and virtuous society, then perhaps we would have some hope. But that is not the way things are.

The youth of our day can be educated, catechized, instructed in ways of the Lord, and taught human goodness and love, this, by the generation that is aged among them. The generation that is on its way out, teachers in all facets, has a great responsibility to the generation that is being born in its dimming eyes. Yet sadly, young boys and girls all have their own individual will and this is often at odds with their fathers and mothers. Furthermore, each generation has its own motivation and so often sails the sea of life without fully understanding the treacherous voyage that that are about to undertake. It is of tragic proportions that old age does not understand youth, and youth does not understand old age.

The first fruits of our reaping, of our immediate future, meet here together with much sin. The thought of the current generation being entrusted with the furtherance of a religious, civil, and moral society is of great concern and worry. For old age, youth is

seldom the hope of the future. Nor can it be—least of all in these turbulent days. The world has in many respects come unglued. Sin legalized. Evil unpunished. Death seen as a friendly exit to suffering. The list of woes could go for miles. And with the young, catechized by such madness, we have little reason to hope.

But regardless of the apparent impending doom, the youth must remain a focal point for the faithful working of the pastor. He should be in the midst of the children right at the beginning. But he does this without any inflated hope. Rather, his focus is on the words which Jesus uttered to Peter, "Feed my sheep." The pastor is to have no part in the corruption of the youth. He simply cannot do whatever he wants with the youth. He has the duty and charge to rear the youth in the discipline and admonition of the Lord. He uses the Gospel seed, spreads it at the proper time with a wise and loving hand, and waters and nourishes the seed with holy care. He prays unceasingly for its growth. His heart is turned toward the youth. Yet the increase is in the hand of the Lord alone. We have little answers or solutions for the problem of growth, but the pastor is responsible for being faithful in how he works.

The pastor is to seek young children everywhere: in the family, in Sunday School, in his catechesis classes, in the church. He seeks the children before they are born as He blesses the pregnant mothers. He cares for the newborn children by calling the parents' attention to their sacred duties toward them and by praying for the unborn. He teaches the new parents spiritual care for the newborn. He teaches them to pray with and for

their children. He blesses the babies. He gets to know all the little children and takes care that he, as their under-shepherd, will be known to them from early on.

With the command of his office the pastor will fight against every temptation and protects the lambs of Jesus against the wolves with every appropriate weapon. That includes the teaching of Holy Scripture, the catechism, hymns, and prayers. These tools impress upon them the seal of Jesus. And this instruction will be understood as catechesis, as the preparation and the context in which the young will receive the Sacrament of the Altar. Church and home will be shown to the children as forming an intimate relationship with one another. All the days of one's youth is to be a preparation for the Sacrament of the Altar. The pastor endeavors to awaken in all children the understanding and goal and center of all catechesis: faith in Jesus, faith in the body and blood of Jesus for the forgiveness of all sins. His entire intention serves the purpose of educating parishioners and penitents, to be saints of God by receiving regularly the gifts of God.

And yet nothing is more certain than the fact that just a few weeks after confirmation spent in ordinary worldly surroundings are sufficient to destroy any fruit of an entire course of pastoral catechesis. But as often as one has this experience, a faithful pastor will press on diligently, seeking the sheep of Jesus as if none of them would ever be lost. Only here does he seek to do the faithful and right thing—everything else he leaves in God's hands.



Sunday School

Our teachers are busy getting ready for the 2017-2018 Sunday School year which begins Sunday, September 10th promptly at 9:15 a.m. for all children age 3 through 8th grade. We meet in the "Music Room" (lower level). We look forward to seeing everyone.

We feel music is an important part of our Sunday School program. We will learn new hymns as well as sing story-related and fun Sunday School songs.

We celebrate birthdays on a weekly basis during our music time. Students and teachers place pennies (one for each year of their life) into our birthday bank. Last year our birthday bank collected a total of \$5.04, which will be used for a special project at a later date.

We will again be using the *Growing in Christ* Sunday School curriculum. In our classrooms the Bible Story is read and told. The Key Point of the story is brought out and applied to the students' lives. The Law/Gospel dynamic in the text is highlighted and applied to the students' lives. The story details are reviewed. Connections are made to the catechism, liturgy, and hymns of the Church.

Stories for September are found in the Old Testament. They include: The Wisdom of Solomon (1 Kings 3), Solomon Builds the Temple (1 Kings 5-6), God Provides for Elijah (1 Kings 17).

We are only asking parents of <u>new</u> students to complete registration forms this year.

We do need to have current information (address and phone numbers) available for each student. Have you moved in the last year? Has your phone number changed? Do we have current contact information should your child become ill during the hour that they are with us each week? Registration forms are available (just ask) or contact Sunday School Superintendent Diane Swanson.

We are always in need of substitute teachers. There are occasions when teachers need to be away. Please contact Diane Swanson immediately if you are interested in helping us.

Attendance is important. Our teachers spend a great deal of time preparing lessons each week. If you know you will be away, we appreciate the "heads up".

Family in Christ,

By now many of you might have heard of the recent attacks in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso (http://www.france24.com/en/20170814-suspected-jihadists-attack-restaurant-burkina-faso). My family arrived in this capital city last Wednesday afternoon having just concluded our Home Service in the States. We were hoping to leave for Togo this Monday morning, but due to an oversight in obtaining documented permission to drive in the country, we were not able to leave. This may have been a good thing as the events of Sunday night unfolded.

Simply put, my family is safe and sound, as are the other missionaries in the area (Rev. Gary and Steph Schulte, Rev. Fred Reinhardt, Rev. Ryan McDermott Family, and Miss Molly Christensen). Ouagadougou is a very spread out capital city of 2.2 million people, of which we were a fair distance away from the events which took place. The vast majority of residents here are grief stricken that this would happen. We will keep them in our prayers and invite you to join us in doing so. Pray also for the army and police who do a great job with the resources they have to protect and serve the people.

Tomorrow morning, Tuesday, as many of you are sleeping, my family will begin the last leg of our journey to Dapaong, Togo, roughly a 6 hour trip. It might be a little longer, but we earnestly seek your prayers. Pray for our travels, safety along the road, and a joyful homecoming. Many people are anticipating our return and we are excited to settle in for the beginning of the academic year. I've been working on a formal newsletter in hopes of sending that out today, but the situation as it is, this email will suffice. If you have further questions of what is going on or of

our situation, please do not hesitate to ask me or direct others directly to me.

I will leave you with this little piece which I just posted on Facebook a short bit ago. Perhaps in the midst of the many events occurring in the States, this will be your prayer as well:

Thank you for all of your prayers and checking in with us. For those who do not know because of the limited coverage of American news sources, there was an attack in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso last night. 18 killed, many wounded. The local police and military handled it well We are safe, secure, a fair distance from that location, and soon to head to our home.

We mourn with the many here who are shaken up and wondering why. It was an opportunity to express mutual concern, thankfulness to those serving in the capacity "to protect and to serve," and pray with those willing to receive prayer.

This morning, we followed the advice of Luther (I believe) who says, "When you aren't sure what to pray, pray the Litany."

"From all sin, from all error, from all evil; From the crafts and assaults of the devil; from sudden and evil death;

From pestilence and famine; from war and bloodshed; from sedition and from rebellion; From lightning and tempest; from all calamity by fire and water; and from everlasting death: Good Lord, deliver us."






These healthy chips make a yummy back-to-school snack.

What you need:

- 4 apples, cored and cut into 1/8 rings
- Large bowl
- Spoon
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Baking sheets (sprayed)

What you do:

- Place apple slices in the bowl. Add cinnamon and sugar. Stir so apples are coated evenly with the mixture.
- Place apple slices on the sprayed baking sheets in a single layer.
- Bake at 200 degrees for two to three hours, until chips are dry but still slightly soft.
